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

It's hard to believe that we are now in March and spring is just around the corner! It feels like just the other day that we were gearing up for "season," finishing summer projects and prepping for things like turf grass overseeding. We now are planning for the upcoming summer projects and looking at the transition from winter rye to Bermuda grass as the temperatures continue to climb. We are hoping for a smoother transition than last year, as it was this time a year ago that I was writing about the impact of tropical storm Hillary. At the time of this writing, we have rain in the forecast, but it is not anticipated to be at that level.

As far as summer projects go, we are in the process of planning those as well. At the February Board meeting, the Board approved the remodeling of the Mountain View and Sunset View Clubhouses. Many of the items in the clubhouse have not been altered since they were originally built so this will be a welcome refresh! The Mountain View remodel will be the following areas: the entry lobby, hallways, Sierra Ballroom, Ventana, Daily Grind/Martinis, Saddleback and Idyllwild rooms. Essentially, it will cover all the meeting rooms and common areas in the clubhouse. The club rooms such as the technology center, ceramics, art, etc., and the Postal Center will not be worked on as their remodel budgets are set in the reserve study for future years.

In the Sunset View Clubhouse, the following areas will be remodeled: the hallway by the Finance Department, the Palms and Oasis rooms (including the small kitchen area), and the library and small sitting area next to the library by the fireplace. Essentially, it will be the rest of the clubhouse starting from the lobby entrance of Boulevards going east. As for Speakers Hall, there is a plan to remodel that as well but, as it is a separate line item in the budget, we plan to bring that remodel forward to the Board for the March or April Board meeting. We plan to do the work this summer. Please keep an eye out for emails regarding when work will happen in each clubhouse. As a result of the work being done, we will need to relocate or potentially cancel some club meetings based on room availability. Irma and the team will work as diligently as possible not to disrupt the routine of the clubs and committees. We thank you in advance for your cooperation and understanding. If you are curious about the overall look of the remodel, you can see the virtual rendering on our website at SCPDCA.com. FINANCIAL REPORT

THROUGH DECEMBER 2024



December 2024 financials were presented to the Finance Committee on Friday, January 31. December finished the month down (\$19K) to budget, \$100K actual vs. \$119K budget. Golf Shop revenue is down and missed budget in December by (\$19K), \$487K actual vs. \$507K budget. Total golf rounds for December are up 108; however,

revenue is down (\$21K) for the month. 18-hole rounds are down (234) rounds and down (\$32K). Year-to-date, Golf Shop is (\$183K) down to budget.

Food & Beverage revenues are down to budget by (\$60K) for the month of December, \$287K actual vs. \$347K budget. Daily Grind is down (\$1,545), Catering is down (\$42), and Boulevards is down (\$58,579). Food & Beverage did manage their flow-thru of expenses in Boulevards. With revenues being down (\$58K), they decreased \$18K on their cost of

sales and \$22K on their salary and wages. Year-to-date Boulevards is up \$38K to budget, (\$254K) actual vs (\$292K) budget. Boulevards remains closed on Mondays.

As of January 29, HR has 10 positions on the Open Positions Report, including 1 AV Set-up, 1 Boulevards, 1 Common Area, 1 Finance Accounts Receivable, 3 Facilities Maintenance positions and 3 Golf Course Maintenance positions.

Sixteen homes closed escrow in December. Reserve Replenishment Assessment (RRA) revenue is \$40,032 for December and fiscal year-to-date revenue is \$303,871.50.

Rolling forecasts were prepared this month including 6 months actual and 6 months forecast. Currently, we are slightly under budget for the fiscal year on the Operations Statement. However, on the Consolidated Statement of Operations, which includes the Spectrum Rebate, (restricted for the Solar Project), we continue to make budget.

Managers continue to review their financials and will look for opportunities to increase revenues and decrease costs.

The Association remains in a sound financial position.



While You Are Away — Are you going out of town? Fill out an out-of-town form at the Mountain View Clubhouse. A Community Patrol Officer will conduct an exterior check of your house at least once a week and notify you if there is a change in status or in case of an emergency until your return. Remember to fill out *all* the information, especially an emergency contact and your expected return date. Have a safe trip and we look forward to your return.

Updating Your Information — Updating your phone number(s) helps the gate officers immensely. When a guest or vendor arrives to come to your address, the officers have had to deny access at times due to the inability to contact you. Updating the phone numbers will help expedite your guests/vendors and keep the traffic from building up at the gates.

Garage Doors — Garage doors must always remain closed, except while working in the garage. The garage door may be partially open 1–2 feet during the summer for ventilation. Community Patrol will call you if your garage door is open. If there is no answer, they will leave a message. The Community Patrol will *not* close your garage door.

Feeding Wildlife — As a reminder, do not feed, supply water, or perform any other act of harboring wildlife (including ducks, pigeons, coots, geese, other waterfowl, or roadrunners) within the community. However, you may feed other birds such as songbirds, hummingbirds, and other similar types of birds. If you are feeding songbirds, please ensure there is a form of food trap to keep it from falling on the ground. This will keep it from attracting pigeons from gathering and feeding in your area. Your neighbors will be very thankful.

Quarterly Meeting — Come join myself and the Public Safety Committee members on March 21 from 9:30-11:30 a.m. in the Ventana room at the Mountain View Clubhouse for coffee and discussion on what has happened in January and February, and things that may concern you. We are here to answer your questions. If we do not have an immediate answer, we will get your information and get back to you as soon as possible. Seated is limited.





Compliance Committee

Handicap Parking

Periodically, the Compliance Committee hears appeals concerning individuals who are in violation of community rules regarding parking in spaces reserved for handicapped persons.

You should know what your license plate or placard allows you to do in our Sun City community. The license plates and placards give you the benefit of parking in spaces specifically designated for disabled individuals. Look for parking spaces with signs that are labeled handicapped parking spaces. In addition, parking is allowed next to a curb that is painted blue. That area is set aside for individuals with disabilities. You may also park next to an area that has a green curb when you must make a quick stop.

You should also be aware of what your California handicap placard or plate *doesn't* allow you to do. **Remember that you**



cannot park in areas with a crosshatch pattern adjacent to a handicapped parking space. The patterned spaces are designated for wheelchair lifts. When parking in handicapped spaces, do not encroach on any area containing a blue crosshatch pattern as this would be considered a parking violation. Do not park at yellow or red curbs, since these areas are for loading and emergency zones, or at white curbs which are used to load and unload passengers.

Please be aware the HOA is working on increasing the number of available handicapped parking spaces at various locations. Thank you for your cooperation!

- Books are filed by the actual author's last name, not by series. Since different authors are taking over series, or assisting in writing them, a series can be found filed under different authors. - Books written by more than one author are filed under the first author's name.
- When you see duplicates of books on the shelf, those are books published either this year or last year.

Golf Cart Fire Safety

Golf carts have become increasingly popular for a variety of uses. However, like any vehicle, golf carts carry the risk of fire. Understanding and implementing proper fire safety measures is crucial to protect users and property.

Several factors can contribute to golf cart fires. The most common causes include:

- a) The batteries and electrical systems golf carts rely on to operate—faulty wiring, short circuits, or damaged battery connections can lead to overheating and sparks, igniting a fire; and
- b) Overcharging the batteries can cause them to overheat and potentially burst into flames.

To minimize the risk of fires, implement the following preventive measures:

- a) Conduct routine inspections of the golf cart's electrical system, battery connections and fuel lines—look for signs of wear, corrosion, or damage and address them promptly;
- b) Only use chargers recommended by the manufacturer and avoid overcharging—remove the charger once the battery is fully charged and ensure the charging area is wellventilated; and
- c) Equip the golf cart with a fire extinguisher rated for class B and C fires. Ensure all users know how to use it and that it is readily accessible in an emergency.

If a fire does occur, follow these steps to ensure safety:

- a) Prioritize personal safety and evacuate the area immediately—do not attempt to retrieve personal belongings from the golf cart;
- b) Contact emergency services to report the fire—provide them with the location and any relevant information about the fire; and
- c) If it is safe to do so and you have been trained, use the fire extinguisher to attempt to put out the fire—aim at the base of the flames and use a sweeping motion.

Golf cart fire safety is a critical aspect of ensuring the well-being of users and protecting property.


C.E.R.T. TRAINING RETURNS TO SUN CITY APRIL 4, 5 and 6

C.E.R.T. (Community Emergency Response Team) is all about building resilient communities, preparing you for the hazards in a disaster that may impact an area where you live. The training course is 20-hours over a weekend in basic disaster skills, such as fire safety, light search & rescue, team organization and disaster medical operations. It is free but you must make reservations.

WHERE DO YOU GET CERT TRAINING?

The easiest answer is here, in Sun City. Riverside County has recertified our community as a FEMA approved training site. In order to register, contact rivcoready.org/cert/registration and click on Sun City location. There are also other training dates and locations in the valley or nearby.

SEARCH & RESCUE TEAM IN SUN CITY

Most of our Search & Rescue team members are CERTs. The following are some of the things they are trained to do but first, in any of these procedures, volunteers are trained not to injure themselves while helping others.

- * PERSONAL SAFETY AND DAMAGE ASSESSMENT In a disaster, your first responsibility is your personal safety and that of your family, including pets. Then you can assist your neighbors by conducting damage assessment and identifying those who need help.
- * INJURY ASSESSMENT, RENDERING BASIC FIRST AID AND MOVING INJURED PERSONS Our Search & Rescue team is trained on conducting head-to-toe assessments and treating injuries. If it is necessary to move a person, there are several techniques that ensure the safety of the volunteer and the injured person.

* FIRE SUPPRESSION

Search & Rescue Teams are outfitted with fire extinguishers and other equipment. Their training involves learning to aim the fire extinguisher at the base of the fire and using a sweeping motion. Teams can try to extinguish small fires but do not have equipment to handle large blazes. In a major disaster, water supplies most likely will be cut off and if the fire has gotten too big, the effort will focus on evacuation.

* CRIBBING

Cribbing is a technique emergency responders use to lift heavy objects that could not be otherwise managed by human strength. Briefly, it involves building several pillars with 2 by 4's, wedges and crowbars high enough so the trapped person can be safely removed from underneath the object. This may be more than a two person activity but it is a means the responders can use to safely lift heavy objects.

DISABILITIES & DISASTER PREPARATIONS

Persons experiencing a major emergency event, like earthquakes, will experience some trauma. For persons with disabilities the level of trauma will be greater. Their individual needs, as related to their disability, will be unique to them during and after the event. Here are some steps you need to take.

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PREPARE FOR A DISASTER

Before an emergency happens, make a Disaster Plan. You need to do what most people do for basic survival: food, water, clean air and any life sustaining items to maintain your health, safety and independence plus some things unique to your individual needs. You also should prepare to be on your own for several days.

✓ SI

SECURE YOUR SPACE

Request assistance from family, friends or a handyman to identify and eliminate home hazards, such as securing items likely to fall (pictures, bookcases), installing latches on cabinets, eliminating clutter, etc.

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PACK A GRAB-N-GO BAG

Prepare a "Grab-N-Go" bag or kit. Assemble supplies you (and any pets or service animals) will need if you must leave your residence for several days to several weeks. Store them in easy to carry containers such as a backpack or duffel bag. Tailor this bag to your specific needs.



ORGANIZE HOME EMERGENCY SUPPLIES

In advance of an emergency event, store and rotate basic supplies which include the essential medications and medical supplies in addition to water and food for yourself and your pets and/or guide dog. The amount of water recommended is 1 gallon per person per day for 2 weeks. Store extra batteries for all your devices. Have at hand a battery-operated, hand-cranked or solar radio and cell phone charger, first aid kit, dust mask, flashlight with extra batteries, whistle to signal for help, wrench to turn off utilities, a manual can opener, sanitation items including plastic bags, local maps, etc. There are many other items to consider and it is suggested you google www.ready.gov/disabilities

DURING AN EARTHQUAKE:

Remember the following safety guide:

Do not try to exit from your home or another building. Time is critical so the safest place is probably where you are. **DROP** where you are, onto your hands and knees, **COVER** your head and neck and if you are under a table or some other shelter, **HOLD ON** with one hand and arm. If you are not under a shelter, **HOLD ON** to your head and neck with both arms an hands. Stay put until the shaking stops.

ADAPTIONS:

If your are in a recliner or bed, stay there. COVER your head and neck with your hands and arms or pillow.

If you are using a walker or rollator, LOCK your wheels. If the walker/rollator has a seat, sit and COVER your head and neck with your hands and arms, book or pillow. Bend over and HOLD ON until the shaking stops.

If you are using a wheelchair, LOCK your wheels and COVER your head and neck with your hands and arms, book, or pillow. HOLD ON until the shaking stops.

AFTER AN EARTHQUAKE/EMERGENCY EVENT:

Earthquakes can and will cause items to fall (there could be lots of broken glass on the floor) and furniture may have shifted which will make navigating around your residence more difficult so move slowly and, if you have a cane available, check for obstacles on the floor. If it is difficult to determine if there are obstacles on the floor, shuffling your feet will reduce your likelihood of falling.





DISASTER TIPS FOR ANY PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES:

- *Wear medical alert tags/bracelets, including communication skills.
- *Carry printed information on your devices for first responders.
- *Plan how you will evacuate with whatever needed assistance and how you will replace it if it's lost, damaged or unavailable.
- *Know the disasters that affect your area & when to shelter in place.

TIPS FOR THE BLIND OR VISUALLY IMPAIRED

- *Mark emergency supplies with Braille labels or large print. Check and rotate routinely.
- *Keep eyeglasses or magnifying devices handy and have extra ones available.
- *Consider your guide dog's needs and make sure you have sufficient food and water for them.
- *If you use a white support cane or a long guide cane, keep extra ones at several locations in the house.
- *If you have low vision, place security lights (ones which come on when power is out) in various rooms and hallways to light paths you travel in case there is a loss of power.

TIPS FOR THE DEAF OR HARD OF HEARING

- *Have a weather radio with text display and flashing alert. Check out smart phone apps.
- *Keep extra batteries or a portable/solar battery charger for hearing aids or cochlear implants.
- *Keep pen and paper handy to communicate with someone who doesn't know sign language.
- *Have extra charging cords and backup batteries.

TIPS FOR THOSE WITH A MOBILITY DISABILITY

- *If you use a power wheelchair, have a lightweight manual chair available as a backup, if possible.
- *If you are using a power wheelchair, pack the charging cord & portable tire air pump when traveling.
- *If an attendant comes daily to assist you in getting in and out of a chair, have alternate plans (a neighbor or friends) in case the assistant cannot come to assist you.

TIPS FOR THOSE WITH SERVICE ANIMALS

- *Always keep an extra harness/leash and a food/water bowl with your Grab-N-Go bag.
- *Always keep the license and ID tags on your service animal and have it chipped.
- *Always keep copies of certification, documentation, immunization records, medications and veterinarian's contact information in your Grab-N-Go bag.
- *Purchase and practice using booties to protect a dog's paws from heat, glass, etc.
- *Be prepared to use alternate equipment/devices if the service animal cannot provide its normal services.
- *Service animals are allowed in shelters, pets are not. Be prepared to provide documentation and to explain the services that the animal provides.

Valley Fever

Anyone who lives in or travels to the southwestern United States (Arizona, California, Nevada, New Mexico, Texas, or Utah), or parts of Mexico or Central or South America can get Valley fever. Valley fever can affect people of any age, but it's most common in adults aged 60 and older. Certain groups of people are at higher risk for developing the severe forms of Valley fever, such as:

- People who have weakened immune systems, for example, people who have HIV/AIDS, had an organ transplant or are taking medications such as corticosteroids or TNFinhibitors
- Pregnant women
- People with diabetes
- · People who are Black or Filipino

Is Valley Fever contagious?

No. The fungus that causes Valley fever, *Coccidioides*, cannot spread from the lungs between people or between people and animals. However, in **extremely** rare instances, a wound infection with *Coccidioides* can spread Valley fever to someone else, or the infection can be spread through an organ transplant with an infected organ.

Should I worry about Valley fever if I am traveling to an area where the fungus is common?

The risk of getting Valley fever is low when traveling to an area where *Coccidioides* lives in the environment, such as the southwestern United States, Mexico, or Central or South America. Your risk for infection could increase if you are in a very dusty setting, but even then the risk is still low.

I have had it before could I get it again?

Usually not. If you have already had Valley fever, your immune system will most likely protect you from getting it again.

Can my pets get Valley fever?

Yes. Pets, particularly dogs, can get valley fever, but it is **not** contagious between animals and people. Like humans, many dogs exposed to *Coccidioides* never get sick. Dogs developing symptoms have coughing, lack of energy, and

weight loss. If you are concerned about your pet's risk of getting Valley fever or if you think that your pet has Valley fever, please talk to a veterinarian.

How can I prevent Valley fever?

It is difficult to avoid breathing in the fungus *Coccidioides* in areas where it is common in the environment. People who live in these areas can try to avoid spending time in dusty places as much as possible. The following are some common-sense methods helpful to avoid getting Valley fever. It is important to know although these steps are recommended, they have not been proven to prevent Valley fever.

• Try to avoid areas with a lot of dust like construction or

excavation sites. If you cannot avoid these areas, wear an N95 respirator (a type of face mask) while you are there.

- Stay inside during dust storms and close your windows.
- Avoid activities involving close contact to dirt or dust, including yard work, gardening, digging, outdoor sports.
- Use air filtration measures indoors.
- Clean skin injuries well with soap and water to reduce the chances of developing a skin infection.
- Take preventive antifungal medication if your healthcare provider says you need it.

Is there a vaccine for Valley fever?

No. Currently, there is no vaccine to prevent Valley fever.

Maintenance & Facilities Update

What a stunning winter season we've been enjoying this year! It's hard to believe that just a year ago, we were recovering from the relentless tropical storms of 2023. While that certainly kept us on our toes, it's a welcome change to shift our focus to current projects rather than piecing everything back together.

This season also presents the perfect opportunity to tackle projects that were sidelined during last year's sweltering summer heat. And before we know it, the temperatures will rise again—but this time, we'll have the welcome shade of brand-new solar canopies in our parking lots to keep us cool. We're thrilled to share updates on recent and ongoing facility projects. Here's a look at some of the latest developments and what's on the horizon:

New Event Setups Department Office (Completed)

Since the pandemic, the Event Setups Department has been operating out of a temporary construction trailer in front of the Mountain View Clubhouse. To provide a permanent and more functional workspace, the Board approved a budget to expand an unused office into a portion of the event storage space behind the Sierra Ballroom. This renovation established a dedicated home for the Event Setups Department, enhancing efficiency and workflow while allowing for the long-awaited removal of the construction trailer.

CVWD Flood Control Channels (Completed)

The extensive construction work at Pineknoll and Brandywine

Parks, which connects Sun City's flood channels to the new flood control system east of Adams Street, was completed in December. This vital flood control connection brings several key benefits to the community, including:

- 1. **Enhanced flood protection** for homes and land in North Indio, reducing the risk of regional flooding.
- 2. **Removal of approximately 2,700 acres** of North Indio from FEMA's Special Flood Hazard Area.
- 3. Elimination of flood insurance requirements for affected residents.

Through a collaborative effort between the Golf Course Maintenance and Engineering Departments, several enhancements were completed at the dog park in January. These improvements include upgraded irrigation, fresh sod, new trees, fencing, a shade structure, and designated golf cart parking—creating a more welcoming and enjoyable space for residents and their furry companions.

Solar Project Update

We're pleased to share that the solar project is progressing smoothly. The project remains on track for full completion in May. Once construction is finished, the final step—interconnection and system activation—will require coordination with Riverside County and IID. This process involves a temporary full power shutdown at each location, which may result in certain clubhouses being closed for several hours until inspections are completed, and power is restored. Email notifications will be sent to the community once these dates are confirmed.

During construction at clubhouse parking lots, some regular parking spaces may be temporarily unavailable, requiring guests to park farther away than usual. We kindly ask for your understanding and urge everyone to drive cautiously around construction zones to ensure the safety of all drivers, pedestrians and workers.

We sincerely appreciate your patience and cooperation as we enhance our facilities with these sustainable improvements.



- This is the time of year the Board and the Executive Committee make recommendations on updating our financial projections. Items affecting those recommendations include:
 - An extremely hot and unbearably long summer combined with an overall decrease in golf in the Coachella Valley has left the income from Golf below projections. This is true for most clubs in the Valley. Plans are in the works to lure more non-residents to our courses.
 - The Food & Beverage income is below projections, but a new Boulevards manager and a new menu might help.
- Our HOA Operations Manager, Jayme Fakehany, has gone on to a new position.
- The construction activity at the Newcastle gate is for the Kia dealership. The owner of the dealership told our General Manager this was merely for an extension of the parking lot; an additional building would not occupy the space.
- The Lake View Recreation Center will soon add four additional ADA compliant parking spaces.
- A "Not a Through Street" sign will be installed at the entrance to Spirito Court.
- For those of you have trouble finding a legal way to dispose of sharps, Burrtec has instituted a sharps hazardous waste program by mail. If interested contact Burrtec. Please stop illegally throwing sharps in the regular trash bins.
- Boulevards will soon have an "interruption" table on Sundays with interesting new offerings.
- The Parkview and Brandywine parks are both completely open now. All work by the CVWD and the HOA has been completed.
- The CVWD has received funding to work on new water lines. The work will be done in District 6, with some work in District 7.
- Plans are in place to repave the streets when all work has been completed.
- The HOA has installed new uplighting on the palm trees on Del Webb Blvd.
- Planting is underway to replace heat damaged plants on the property.
- Plans are approved and in place for a major reinvestment in the Mountain View and Sunset View Clubhouses. The refurbishment will align with the style of the newly renovated Boulevards Restaurant. This will include floor, wall and ceiling coverings, furniture replacement, and light fixtures. We have not renovated in 20 years. This will be expensive, but it will allow us to compete with the newer projects in the valley.

In our last segment of the "Behind the Scenes" series, *News & Views* explores three additional aspects of our community that keep us entertained, organized and safe.

The Green Room

Nestled behind the Sierra Ballroom stage, and unbeknownst to many, is a well-equipped, Hollywood-style Green Room. Available to Sun City clubs and outside talent, the Green Room offers a relaxing environment to prepare for performances. The room is used to apply makeup, change clothes, review scripts, steam one's throat, or simply relax before and between performances.

The room was designed over twenty years ago when Les Surlow, president of Music Buffs, saw a need and found the perfect space to create this haven. Resident artists decorated the walls with quotes and musical instruments. To this day, professional performers are impressed with the facility and how well they are handled when they arrive for a show. Likewise, resident performers enjoy a comfortable spot to sip a cold drink, reapply their makeup, or rehearse their lines.

Meeting Rooms

A seamless, well-oiled machine—that's the perfect way to describe the daily operations behind preparing Sun City's meeting rooms and banquet spaces. The nine indoor rooms, across three clubhouses, are constantly reconfigured to host Committees, Chartered Clubs, Resident Groups, and outside organizations. In addition, residents and non-residents can also reserve one of nine outdoor areas, such as the pool area, tennis courts, bocce courts and softball field, for their events.

Behind the scenes are a dedicated team of employees

managing every detail. From arranging tables and preparing food to assembling decorations and fine-tuning audio-visual equipment, they ensure everything is in place. In fact, rooms are often turned around and prepped for the next event as many as three times a day!

The planning begins a year in advance with an e-blast inviting groups to reserve their rooms and catering services. Irma Lopez, Event Coordinator, skillfully manages these requests using FASTbooks, an event-planning software. Chartered Clubs enjoy free room reservations, while Resident Groups pay a discounted fee. Irma aims to lock down all room reservations in early spring. Any remaining slots are made available to outside groups based on a predetermined fee schedule, generating additional revenue for the community.

All rooms and outside areas must be reserved through the Events Office at 760-200-2200 or 200-2241.

Perry Jeres, AV/Set-up Supervisor, and his team of seven full-time staff are cross trained to handle room setups and operate A/V equipment. They manage sound and lighting for concerts, project presentations on large screens, and ensure microphones are checked, placed, and ready for use. Over the past 22 years, Perry and his team have continuously upgraded the A/V technology, which now includes fully digital audio, lighting and microphones. Perry's goal is to keep Sun City well equipped with state-of-the-art systems to enhance every event.



Trever Blanton, Catering Manager, has worked in the community for 10 years. He oversees catering for all three clubhouses and outdoor meeting spaces. Food is prepared in the fully equipped kitchen behind the Ventana Room, which was once Sun City's main restaurant before the establishment of Boulevards. Groups using our facilities use the catering services of Trever and nine front-of-house staff and six back-of-house staff. On occasion, groups can bring in simpler meals like pizza or a potluck. In 2025, Trever will be working with Julie Pope, the new Activities Coordinator, to bring residents exciting new entertainment and community events.

We are immensely grateful for the expertise and dedication these professionals bring to their jobs. Their passion and hard work shines through every day!

Community Patrol

Erik Stacklie, Community Patrol Director, has been in the security field since 2000 and has worked in Sun City for 12 years. Erik currently supervises 24 officers who provide 24-hour security coverage throughout the community. All are trained on driving, though some work solely at the gates. Their normal work shifts run from 5:30 a.m.–2 p.m., 1:30–10 p.m., and 9:30 p.m.–6 a.m. The over lapping times are used to pass down information between shifts or to discuss training topics. During the daytime hours, three patrol officers are assigned at the main gate, one at the North gate. In the afternoon through the early evening hours, two officers are at the main gate, while one is assigned to the North gate. One patrol officer mans the main gate during the graveyard shift; the North Gate is closed during these hours. Erik sometimes comes in at 2:00 am just to help the graveyard shift.

There are a total of three drivers patrolling the entire community 24/7. The drivers have no set route, however, in the course of a 24-hour period, every street is driven by a minimum of three times. The daytime patrols focus on moving violations while the nighttime patrols focus on parking violations, open garages and closely watching the

perimeter of the community for possible trespassers. The nighttime patrols keep the flashing "light bar" on top of their vehicles turned on, to assure the residents of their presence and to alert possible trespassers. All drivers wear a body camera at all times.

Other than speeding and stop sign violations, patrol officers do not typically issue other citations between 7 a.m. -7 p.m. When non-moving violations occur, the community patrols contact the violators and give them a warning which includes a time frame of when to resolve the violations. Although the HOA regulations state that trash cans must be in by midnight, the community patrols have not been issuing citations until 8 a.m. the following day. For reasons such as trash being picked up late and residents going to bed early or getting home late, several trash cans were left out after midnight. Issuing the citations at 8 a.m. the following day, has cut down on trash can violations tremendously, according to Erik.

Erik wants to emphasize that the community patrols are here to observe and report, not to protect life and property. The officers are cross trained for both gate and patrol duties but not as police officers. For criminal activities, residents are urged to call 911 before contacting the Community Patrol as they cannot make arrests or detain the perpetrators. "Our community patrol officers are willing to help any way they can, but all they can do is a citizen's arrest," said Erik. "They are trained to act professionally but will (and are allowed to) defend themselves when confronted by unruly residents or guests, (who may get physical)," continued Erik.

Knowing these dedicated patrol officers' professionally trained eyes and ears are out there 24/7 looking after our safety and well-being, we can feel protected.

For future plans of this department Erik said, "Our current lift gates will be replaced with lighted arms that turn red when down and slowly turn to green as they go up."



The Calling

They called her "The Diva" for her impeccable fashion sense and commanding presence.

Known as Mrs. Getz during her years as an educator, Josephine (Jo) Salata didn't merely choose teaching as a career—she answered a calling. "I believe education is the great equalizer. I was determined to empower my students with that opportunity."

Jo first found her inspiration in her third-grade teacher. "Josephine, I'm going to open up that brain you're hiding," she would say. She succeeded. Jo went on to earn a BA from UCLA and an MA from California Lutheran University. It was the start of a teaching career that would inspire generations.

Jo's early teaching days were anything but ordinary. While teaching in Watts, "a fight broke out between two angry girls," she recalled. "Their classmates cheered them on, encouraging them to really hit each other. The doors were locked from the outside once class began—what would you expect from a school surrounded by barbed wire?" As one girl's glasses shattered and blood streaked her face, Jo did her best to separate them. "Fortunately for me, a physical education teacher saw the situation through the window and broke it to rescue me and stop the fight," she said. Afterward, the principal—impressed by her composure under such duress—offered to buy her a drink. Jo grinned, "I took him up on his offer."

When Jo later transitioned to more affluent schools, she often taught the children of celebrities—like Chuck Connors, best known as *The Rifleman*. "I had no idea who the father of an unruly student was until his 6'6" frame sashayed into my classroom for a parent/teacher conference." With Jo occupying the only adult chair, the towering actor had no choice but to squeeze into a student desk. "Picturing him struggling twice as hard to get out as he did to get in still makes me smile." The son's behavior straightened out after that.

Jo specialized in Honors and Advanced Placement Composition and Literature. These courses allowed her to emphasize critical thinking and analysis. Her classrooms were dynamic environments where students weren't just taught to read and write—they were trained to think deeply and to articulate their thoughts. Jo chose novels and crafted lessons around the *Alienation and Isolation of Twentieth Century Man*. This encouraged her students to explore complex emotions and societal challenges through the lens of the 20th century's greatest works. By aligning her selections with the AP exams, Jo ensured her students were well-prepared academically.

"An educator has to explore all learning modalities—auditory, visual, kinetic, and tactile—and sometimes just throw it at the walls," Jo explained, emphasizing her adaptive teaching philosophy. This approach allowed her to connect with as many students as possible.

Following 31 years of transforming lives in the classroom, Jo retired from the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD) in June 1999. What started as a dinner invitation to celebrate Jo's teaching career turned into an unforgettable surprise. As she stepped into the Granada Hills restaurant, cheers and applause erupted. Hundreds of former students—some from as far back as the 1980s—greeted her. "Surprise!" Jo stood speechless, moved by the outpouring of love on this unforgettable night.

A highlight of the evening was the presentation of a binder. The front cover read: *Memories, with Love, Your Students*. Inside were hundreds of handwritten notes—some with colorful illustrations, still others with attached photos. Over the years, the binder has grown, filled with letters and photos from students who have gone on to pursue their dreams and still keep in touch.

Just weeks before her surprise retirement party, Jo received the Los Angeles Excellence in Education Award. It was presented by actor Cuba Gooding Jr. at the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion. By 1999, she had already accumulated a litany of teaching awards and had been listed in *Who's Who* Among

American Teachers three times. She would go on to earn four more listings *after* her retirement. In 2018, she was also honored with the prestigious Albert Nelson Marquis Lifetime Achievement Award.

"I live by two guiding mantras," Jo said. "The first: never simply cover a subject—uncover it. The second: always be in the process of becoming—whether as a wife, mother, artist, or friend. Become better each day."

After retiring, she and her husband Frank relocated to Sun City to embrace a calmer, more creative phase of their lives. Jo became an accomplished artist in acrylic painting and glasswork. Her passion for glasswork began when a carpenter building their home bar admitted he didn't work with glass. Jo took on the challenge herself and discovered a lifelong love. Acrylic painting, on the other hand, started as a favor to a friend seeking company in attending a class. The friend quit. Jo never stopped.

"Glass is my first love. Painting, a mere second. The first time I completed a glass piece, I also felt complete. Glasswork is expensive, and I use acrylics as an inexpensive way to experiment with color and design." Her experiments have produced hundreds of striking, award-winning paintings.

Jo is also one of the rare artisans who makes Tiffany reproduction lamps. To date, she has created 27 vibrant and colorful lamps, each composed of hundreds of individually cut, foiled, and soldered glass pieces. It's a meticulous process taking up to eight months to complete. The largest lamp had over 1,200 individual pieces!

Driven by a desire to help others discover the joy of creating, Jo returned to teaching. From 2006 to 2012, she taught acrylics at Brandeis University Women's Extension, spending summers in Cape Cod. For the past six years, she has taught both acrylics and glass art here in Sun City.

Jo Salata spent her life mastering the art of teaching. The classroom was her studio; knowledge and inspiration, her mediums; and young minds, her canvas. But her life's work isn't just about teaching or creating—it's about making the world a brighter place. And in that, she continues to succeed.

When necessary, she would also impart some lessons about life, making me realize that life was never going to be a bed of roses. Her influence on me was the cornerstone of my successful career.

It's interesting how someone you don't know can influence you. When I went clothes shopping, I opted for high-waisted trousers or shoes I could never wear on the street for fear of twisting an ankle. But I wore those shoes in my office. I tried to look less slovenly, especially if I had client meetings. Did she notice the change in my appearance?

I still return to New York to visit friends, go to the ballet and opera, see new exhibits, but I've lost this woman. Is she still on the same path or has she moved on like I have? I regret not acknowledging her, been the one to make the first move. Maybe she would have acknowledged me.






The Bookshelf



Did You Know...

My husband is a Diet Cherry Coke (bleah) fan, and I was reading an article about uses for Coke and had occasion to try one of the suggestions. 
Body lotion – A spoonful of Coke with regular lotion can give skin a silky look. (I'll just take their word for it. I don't want to attract ants.)

What's Cooking?

Pollo Al Limone (Lemon Chicken)

We have now reached the main course, or the "secondo piatto." Traditionally it is composed of either beef, chicken or fish. Today I am cooking chicken, which has become a main protein component of Italian dishes, especially when cooked in a pan style. My mother made it fast; I couldn't believe it had just a few steps. Once you try it, it will be one of your favorite dishes too. It is a pleasant and light-tasting dish, good for company or when you want to bring some Mediterranean flavor to your meals. Serve with jasmine rice and/or sauteed broccoli.

- 1 lb. Sliced chicken breast or tenders (lightly pounded)
- 2–3 tbs. Extra Virgin Olive Oil
- 3–4 garlic cloves
- Flour
- 1 lemon
- Sage
- 1 tsp. of Boullion mixed with 2 tbs. of warm water

Prepare the chicken by dusting it with flour on both sides. Squeeze the lemon and add 2 tbs of water. Place the garlic cloves in a large pan with the EVOO. Remove garlic when lightly golden. Place chicken in the pan and add the sage leaves. Turn chicken slices and add the watered bouillon and lemon juice. Cook at medium heat for 4–5 minutes or until most of the water has evaporated, leaving enough emulsion to spoon over the chicken. Garnish with slices of lemon.

A glass of pinot grigio will add a sparkle to the evening. *Cheers and buon appetito!*

An additional wine was served this month giving members two white wines and three red wines.

We enjoyed a San Simeon Sauvignon Blanc, fermented in stainless and neutral barrels and a Windstream Chardonay, fermented in 100% French oak barrels. They were paired with a beautifully prepared Asian inspired shrimp cocktail with fried capers and pickled radish.

The red wines included an Opaque 2020 Darkness Red Blend, aged in new French and American barrels with aromas of black cherry, raspberry and dark chocolate. Next was an Opaque 2021 Tannat, a new release aged in 100% French oak with aromas of black plum and blueberry. Last was a Riboli Family 2019 Cabernet Sauvignon, from their Rutherford vineyard. This is a deep dark red wine rich in flavors of blackberries, blueberries and tannins. These were served with a delicious and tender Korean short rib with jasmine rice and baby Bok choy.
