The start of a new year usually brings change with lots of things happening around the Association. For example, on January 11 two years ago we had the long-awaited grand opening of Boulevards. The first day was busy with over 200 reservations made and multiple walk-ins that frequented the bar and fire pit areas. Since then, we have seen quite a few changes, the main one being our Food & Beverage Director, Alex. Since Alex has been on board, he has increased our Happy Hour times and offerings as well as our interruption tables. These interruption tables feature staff serving up tacos on Tuesdays (2 for \$6), Sloppy Joes on Thursdays (also \$2 for 6) and other great happy hour deals other days of the week. For more information, please see Alex's article on page 22.

In other happenings, staff is busily preparing for our 2025–2026 fiscal year's budget. It seems odd to mention those years as many years ago it seemed like 2025–26 would be a futuristic world filled with holograms and flying cars, or at least they would be available to the general consumer! As for the budget, staff will be reviewing where we are to date know that we have six months of actual financials under our belt and use that to help forecast for next year. Per our budget schedule, HOA staff, after review with the Finance Department and the GM, will submit their preliminary budgets to the Board and Finance Committee on Friday, February 28. There will be a meeting to review the budget on Friday, March 14, again with the Board and Finance Committee. This will give all parties involved time to carefully and diligently comb through the budget making any needed changes until it goes before the Board for approval on May 6. Future updates on the budget process and status will be posted in my articles to come, so stay tuned!

Concurrent with the budget each year, we also start into our election cycle. This year we had four Board member terms that were up for reelection. We began accepting applications on December 9 and the deadline to turn them in was Friday, January 10 at 4 p.m. At the close of day, we had four applicants for the four open positions. The applications that were turned in were the four incumbent Board members whose terms are expiring: Randy Dugger, Sue Rogoff, Tom Liebermann and Greg Howser. As there were four applicants for four open positions, we do not need to hold an election this year and can do it by acclimation per California law. I would personally like to thank Randy, Sue, Tom and Greg for continuing to serve on the Board of Directors and for their past leadership.

FINANCIAL REPORT

THROUGH NOVEMBER 2024



The November 2024 financials were presented to the Finance Committee on Friday, January 3. November finished the month up \$93K to budget, \$364K actual vs. \$271K budget. Golf Shop revenue is down and missed budget in November by (\$70K), \$417K actual vs. \$487K budget. Total golf rounds for November are down

(789) along with revenues down (\$82K) for the month. YTD, Golf Shop is (\$164K) down budget. The extreme high summer temperatures are contributing to the decline in golf play by (2,282) rounds vs. budget for the first five months of the Fiscal Year.

Food & Beverage revenues are down to budget by (\$64K) for the month of November, \$304K actual vs. \$368K budget. Daily Grind is down (\$4K), Catering is down (\$20K), and Boulevards is down (\$40K).

The Food & Beverage Department did manage their flow-thru of expenses in Boulevards. With revenues being down (\$40K), they decreased \$15K on their Cost of Sales and \$33K on their salary and wages. Boulevards finished the month with a loss of (\$22K) actual vs. (\$28K) budget. YTD, Boulevards is up \$61K to budget, (\$205K) actual vs (\$267K) budget. Boulevards remains closed on Mondays.

As of December 23, HR has four positions on their Open Positions Report. These open positions include three Facilities Maintenance positions and one Golf Course Maintenance position.

There were 14 homes that closed escrow in the month of November. Reserve Replenishment Assessment (RRA) revenues are \$35,028 for November and fiscal YTD revenues are \$278,770.

Rolling forecasts were prepared this month including five months actual and seven months forecast. Currently, we are on track to make budget for the fiscal year.

The Association remains in a sound financial position.

Board of Directors' Meeting Report · 1-7-25

SUMMARY OF BOARD ACTION ITEMS AND MOTIONS

25-01-100 – Authorize Guralnick & Gilliland, Attorneys at Law, as the Association's attorney and agent, to execute and record an assessment lien on the following properties pursuant to the Association's Collection Policy: Account # 791028 and Account # 790164. *MTA BAI 25-01-100 (Howser/Rogoff) carried unanimously.*

25-01-101 – Approve the revised bylaws for the Mountain Vista Ladies Golf Club (MVLGC), a Sun City Palm Desert Charter Club. *MTA BAI 25-01-101 (Rogoff/Long) carried unanimously.*

25-01-102 — Authorize the purchase of ten (10) replacement treadmills from TechnoGym, at a cost of \$127,433 with a 5% contingency fund of \$6,372 to cover unforeseen expenses, for a total estimated expenditure of \$133,805 to be paid from the Replacement Reserves fund. This purchase is necessary to replace aging gym equipment and ensure the continued safety, functionality, and satisfaction of facility users. *Tom Liebermann advised the vendor was selected based on their service plan and positive recommendations from other communities and facilities. MTA BAI 25-01-102 (Liebermann/Rogoff) carried unanimously.*

25-01-103 – Request for installation of flashing LED Stop sign per recommendation received by Public Safety Committee. Amount not to exceed \$2,500 which will include installation of pole for stop sign and paint 'Stop' with line on street where stop sign is to be installed. *Cost within staff authority to approve, however staff would like approval on installation request heading southbound on Mojave Sage at Suncliff Circle. MTA BAI 25-01-103 (Long/Howser) carried unanimously.*

25-01-104 – Disclose the expedited authorization granted to Spreck Energy to utilize and widen the existing underground trench path currently being used for the solar project. The scope includes furnishing and installing an additional 120 feet of four 2-inch diameter PVC conduits to accommodate future 400 amp power requirements for EV (Electric Vehicle) chargers, which will support the new and future electric-powered Golf Course Maintenance (GCM) equipment. The total cost for this work is \$9,856, to be funded from Replacement Reserves. Steve Rheuban and Clint Atherton noted that this additional project will be charged to Reserves as it is not part of the current solar project; this would need to be facilitated regardless but will be easier to complete with the existing trench. MTA BAI 25-01-104 (Rheuban/Liebermann) carried unanimously.

25-01-105 – Disclose the expedited authorization to purchase twenty-eight (28) new "spectator chairs" from Wayfair for the Billiards room for a total cost of \$9,835 to be paid from Replacement Reserves. *MTA BAI 25-01-105 (Long/Rheuban) carried unanimously*.

The complete approved minutes of the Board of Directors' Meetings are located in the Library and on the SCPDCA website.


I'm excited to share that all tickets for the Trivia event and The Smooth Brothers concert sold out in January!



It's that time of year again...election season! The time when members of the Board of Directors and the Delegate Council decide whether to run for another term or to step down. It's either, "enough!" or "I can continue to serve."

Why do some choose to serve in the first place...to volunteer? Is it boredom? Ego? Recognition? To begin to understand this answer, you need to understand the core of Sun City's success...volunteerism! Without volunteers, this community would be hard pressed to provide the services and amenities it does and still maintain one of the lowest HOA assessments in the Valley. Think about it.

With some twenty-two million dollars (\$22M) in our Reserves, we have a Finance Committee of volunteers with backgrounds in banking, accounting and financial management who work with our Finance Director, and financial advisor, to ensure the investments remain stable and growing.

We have another committee, Lifestyle Enhancement, of volunteers who develop design guidelines for our homes and grounds to ensure some degree of continuity throughout the community. (No one gets to paint their garage door plum with orange trim.) Another committee of volunteers, Compliance, enforces these guidelines.

A committee devoted just to Insurance, annually reviews all the HOA insurance policies (workers comp, earthquake, property, etc.) to ensure we maintain the best coverage, with the most cost-effective premiums. We have a dedicated group of Strategic Planning volunteers who continually identify what should be addressed in the future to keep Sun City a viable and enticing community. Marketing, part of our Community Marketing and Activities Committee (CMAC) publicizes our uniqueness to those seeking an active, adult community. Fitness and Recreation (FRC) continually research new activities and programs designed to keep us active.

Serving on the Council provides you with an understanding as to how things work, listening to your concerns and speaking on your behalf. To gain more in-depth knowledge, many also serve on the Standing Committees, some of which were previously discussed. I left out Golf, Emergency Preparedness and Public Safety, to name a few others, each with equally meaningful purposes.

For a few, the Council serves as a prelude to serving on the Board. After several terms on the Council, and in-depth work with at least one of the Standing Committees, some are prepared for the next step...the Board of Directors.

Alumnae of the Council and the Finance Committee constitute the incumbent members of the Board. The path is clear...all it takes is commitment and a desire to serve.

Top Priority of Our Patrol

Our Community Patrol puts our public safety first. They show a proactive presence in every area of our gated community. Their presence day and night acts as a deterrence of illegal activities. Their presence helps the residents feel safe and secure.

We are fortunate to have three types of Community Patrol in Sun City: foot patrol, vehicle patrol and technology-assisted patrol.

Community Patrol drives marked patrol vehicles, covering large areas of our community 24 hours a day. Each Community Patrol is given a designated route. They check unauthorized access into our community. They provide rapid and efficient response. They have the ability and visibility to respond quickly in emergencies, such as medical, fire or security breaches. They also check in with residents if their front door lights are blinking.

Sometimes Community Patrol physically monitors areas with limited vehicle access such as dog parks, golf courses and areas with suspicious activities. At times, a more personal approach is necessary, especially if a resident's car or golf cart is not operating. They assist and support residents, visitors, vendors and employees who need a helping hand.

Community Patrol has advanced surveillance technologies, such as cameras and radar to monitor driving areas. Our vehicle patrols also wear live video cameras. These real-time videos provide surveillance when needed throughout our premises. Our patrol agents write reports of all incidents which occur and inform their supervisor of such a report.

Eric Stacklie, our Director of Community Patrol, sends a weekly update by e-mail to all registered residents and writes quarterly articles for *News & Views* to ensure the community is well-informed and involved. Eric also schedules quarterly meetings in the Ventana Room at the Mountain View Clubhouse. These meetings allow us to discuss things happening in our community and any issues you may want to address. These activities demonstrate a commitment to the community's well-being and build credibility and rapport.

As I've mentioned above, the top priority of our Community Patrol is to promote a safer living environment and provide peace of mind to our over 9,000 residents.

What Does the Public Safety Committee Actually Do?

Some residents may be unaware that there is a Public Safety Committee, and those who are aware may be confused about what we do. You may have recently become aware of the Public Safety Committee because we have been advertising for new members.

We meet once a month from September through May. While we currently have five members, we are authorized to have nine. We each serve two-year terms or longer. Our primary responsibility is to analyze issues brought to us by the Board of Directors and suggest solutions. The Board will take our suggestions, discuss them, and, if they deem appropriate, implement them. Many of the issues involve traffic safety, parking, speeding, crosswalks and stop signs.

At each meeting we listen carefully to the Community Patrol Director as he gives us the traffic stats for the month, looking for trends which may need our input. Some residents mistakenly think we supervise the Community Patrol, but we do not. We may make suggestions, but those go to the HOA Board and/or Operations Manager for their consideration.


We present two annual seminars: the Riverside County Sheriff's Crime Prevention seminar in January, and the CHP's Safe Driving seminar in February.

"HEARTS IN RHYTHM"

Thursday, February 20, 9:30-11:30 a.m. Speakers Hall, Sunset View Clubhouse

Dealing with a heart that has electrical problems is a journey I began this spring. There were no previous symptoms, only a sudden episode of garbled speech. This led to an overnight hospital stay with tests galore. Those tests showed no stroke but a later trip to a cardiologist and a simple in-office test resulted in a diagnosis of AFib. I am only sharing this to stress the importance being alert to problems your heart might encounter and the ways it can be treated. As we age, health problems do occur and managing them intelligently leads to better results. Fortunately, in the case of heart care, many new procedures have become available. This is an opportunity for you to learn about heart rhythms, what may need correcting and treatment options.

"Hearts in Rhythm" is part of the Desert Care Network's Heart 2 Heart educational series. Today, some 3 million Americans live with atrial fibrillation (AFib), which is a condition causing the heart to quiver and affecting the heart's ability to efficiently pump blood to the rest of the body. Over time, and if left untreated, AFib can lead to significant heart damage.

Speaking at this presentation is a cardiologist who deals with electrophysiology or electrical problems of the heart, including diagnosis and treatment of cardiac arrhythmias and complex cardiac conditions. The discussion explains how a quivering or irregular heartbeat is diagnosed and treated through surgery or non-surgical methods, such as medication management, pacemakers and the Watchman implant. Other cardiac related specialists will be joining us to share tips on leading a heart-healthy life.

MORE INFORMATION TO THINK ABOUT. AFib is the most common type of irregular heartbeat that often causes the heart to beat too quickly. It increases the risk of stroke about 5 times if untreated. Symptoms of AFib are an irregular heartbeat, heart racing, chest pain, shortness of breath and fatigue. Blood pressure reading is determined by systolic and diastolic blood pressures. Systolic is the top number, measuring the force the heart exerts on the walls of the arteries each time it beats, while diastolic is the pressure in between beats. Below 120 systolic is considered normal and below 80 diastolic. Source: Mayo Clinic

Some "Feel-Good Ways to Lower Your Blood Pressure" from AARP: take a hot bath daily (the high temps cause blood vessels to dilate and reduces stress), just stretch (improves blood flow), filter your coffee (may reduce levels of oils in coffee which raise cholesterol levels), and practice tai chi (reduces stress).

If Disaster Occurs in Your District -

You were asleep, but now you are very much awake. You are wondering if you are going to be thrown out of your bed onto the floor. You hear glass breaking, metal grinding, pictures falling off walls, furniture falling over and lamps exploding. The picture over the bed has fallen on your wife and her head is bleeding, or at least it feels wet and you assume it is blood. She is unresponsive. The shaking feels like it is never going to stop.

Finally, the shaking stops and you roll over to your wife. She is still not moving or speaking. You hear some whimpering from the hall and you realize that your dog isn't on the bed with you as she usually is, but must have known something was coming and ran out of the bedroom. You have a flashlight in the drawer next to your bed because you always do. You leave your wife for a moment to take a look around and see how much damage your home has taken in case it is not safe to stay there. Fortunately, you have hard-soled sandals secured next to the bed because there seems to be broken glass everywhere. It's dark. The light switches don't work. Thankfully the flashlight is working. The chandelier you were so proud of in your entry has fallen. There is broken glass near a limping dog. You need help for your wife first, and maybe someone to help your dog as well. You wonder what to do.

Simultaneously, the Emergency Preparedness Committee has activated. Volunteers are assembling at their assignments. Block Captain Coordinators are retrieving their radios and Red Bags, which contain all the equipment to set up a Command Post. AM 1620 radio station is operating with current news of conditions in Sun City. Situation analysis has begun and internal and community radio communications are being tested.

You know there is an Emergency Preparedness Committee in Sun City because they talk about it all the time. It's always been nice to know it is there, but you really didn't have time for it with all the other activities and clubs. You know that twice a year somebody (is it a block captain?) comes by and speaks briefly with you or leaves papers for you if you aren't home. You turn your flashlight on your partner's head. You try to stop your wife's bleeding. (Should have attended that "Stop the Bleed" class). You are starting to get panicky. You need to save your wife. Your cell phone doesn't work, nor does your land line or computer. You know there are a bunch of folks who have tried to prepare for this. How do you reach them?

Meanwhile, the Command Posts are opening up. Radio communications are established with the Emergency Operations Center. Block Captains will be checking in and be outfitted to start their assignments. They too had to cope with their own problems and now can report to help others. Search and Rescue has started checking on the clubhouses for damage and occupants that may be trapped inside. If there is no structural damage to the Tennis Court structure at MVCH, that First Aid Station will be first to open.



EPC Command Post District 1- B

Although there is some physical difference in their appearance, each of the 36 Command Posts (CP) have the following:; a CP banner, a two-way radio to talk to Emergency Operations Center, walkie-talkie radios for each Block Captain to talk to the CP in their district, their home assignment sheets, vests and other miscellaneous gear.

There is a knock on your door. Your next door neighbor and buddy has come to check on you and you describe your situation. You have stopped the bleeding on your wife's head but she is unconscious and you don't want to leave her. Considering it is a head injury and there appears to be no danger staying in the home, you shouldn't try to move her until it's determined there are no other head, neck or spine injuries. The neighbor offers to go to your Command Post but sees the Block Captain down the street, checking on homes and calls out. Your problems are given to the Block Captain, who calls for assistance from the Emergency Operations Center. In turn, they dispatch a Medical Mobile Team to assist you. Chances are your wife has a concussion, which requires rest and close observation.

Pet Rescue has dispatched a team to check on your dog. The dog has a sprained leg and small cut from the chandelier which fell but other than being anxious, is doing OK.

Because of the possible magnitude and time lag element of on-site available assistance in a major disaster, there are limits to what first responders can do. So the more you have learned to care for those in your household, the better off you all will be. While we cannot promise you will always have a positive conclusion to emergencies, what we do know is that disaster preparedness contributes to survival and recovery.





Ways To Moisturize Your Skin

Dry skin occurs when skin doesn't retain sufficient moisture. This can happen as a result of frequent bathing, use of harsh soaps, aging or certain medical conditions.

During winter months you may suffer from red, rough, raw and itchy skin. This is because cold winter air means low humidity, both outdoors and indoors. The water content of the epidermis (the outermost layer of skin) tends to reflect the level of humidity around it.

Keeping moisture in the skin

Skin moisturizers, which rehydrate the top layer of skin cells and seal in the moisture, are the first step in combating dry skin. They contain three main types of ingredients. Humectants, which help attract moisture, include ceramides (pronounced ser-A-mids), glycerin, sorbitol, hyaluronic acid, and lecithin. Another set of ingredients—for example petrolatum (petroleum jelly), silicone, lanolin and mineral oil—help seal that moisture within the skin. Emollients, such as linoleic, linolenic and lauric acids, smooth skin by filling in the spaces between skin cells.

In general, the thicker and greasier a moisturizer, the more effective it will be. Some of the most effective (and least expensive) are petroleum jelly and moisturizing oils (such as mineral oil). Because they contain no water, they're best used while the skin is still damp from bathing to seal in the moisture.

What can you do about dry skin?

Here are some ways to combat dry skin that are effective if practiced consistently:

- 1. Use a humidifier in the winter. Set it to around 60%, a level that should be sufficient to replenish the top layer of the skin.
- 2. Limit yourself to one 5- to 10-minute bath or shower daily. Use lukewarm rather than hot water, which can wash away natural oils.

- 3. Minimize your use of soaps, and choose moisturizing preparations such as Dove, Olay and Basis, or consider soap-free cleansers like Cetaphil, Oilatum-AD and Aquanil. Steer clear of deodorant soaps, perfumed soaps and alcohol products, which can strip away natural oils.
- 4. To avoid damaging the skin, stay away from bath sponges, scrub brushes and washcloths. If you don't want to give them up altogether, be sure to use a light touch. For the same reason, pat or blot (don't rub) the skin when toweling dry.
- 5. Apply moisturizer immediately after bathing or washing your hands. This helps plug the spaces between your skin cells and seal in moisture while your skin is still damp.
- 6. To reduce the greasy feel of petroleum jelly and thick creams, rub a small amount into your hands and then rub it over the affected areas until neither your hands nor the affected areas feel greasy.
- 7. Never, ever scratch. Most of the time, a moisturizer can control the itch. You can also use a cold pack or compress to relieve itchy spots.
- 8. Use fragrance-free laundry detergents and avoid fabric softeners.
- 9. Avoid wearing wool and other irritating garments next to your skin.

George and Barbara Normandin took home the \$100 team payout finishing in first place.

The next Golf Shop-sponsored event will be on Thursday, February 6 with the long-awaited return of the Can-Am Tournament. This has been a very popular event in years past where our contingent of full-time residents (Americans) play for bragging rights against snowbird residents (Canadians). This would eliminate the need for the over seeding process in the fall which brings unhealthy air quality due to the scalping of the warmer season grass needed to over seed with cooler season Rye grass. Other benefits to seriously consider moving to Zoisya turf would be the significant savings in maintenance cost as well as the ever-rising cost of seed and water. Lastly, and perhaps most importantly, the golf courses would never have to shut down for the four-week period it takes to over seed. Yes, this means our courses would never need to close. This would have a very positive impact on generating more revenue. If you were unable to attend the presentation, it was recorded, and you can find it on the SCPD website.



- The representatives of the Softball Club presented a plan to improve the softball field. Because the field is in one of the flood control channels, approval is required from CVWD as well as the HOA and the neighboring homes.

 Much effort has already gone into this plan. It would include a permanent chain link fence with a green fence cap and a warning track, a permanent 20' flagpole, a field sign, and an announcer and scoring booth.
- The LEC presented new suggested home paint color schemes. These will be posted in all clubhouses. Homeowners wishing to use the new schemes will have to wait until they are officially approved. The old schemes can still be used until the new ones are approved.
- Please remember a licensed driver must pilot golf carts. During the holidays, people saw children driving golf carts. This is a hazard to both the folks on the cart and innocent drivers and pedestrians. The homeowner can be cited if their cart is driven by an unlicensed driver.
- Homeowners have complained about the "temporary" raised flat area created on the East side of Adams after CVWD finished their work on the Adams Street water line project. The area attracts two-, three- and four-wheel vehicles to play. Noise and dust have become a nuisance in an area that was previously free of problems. Homeowners living nearby have requested help from the AQMD, CVWD, and now the HOA to put a stop to this unnecessary nuisance.
- Because trash collection in Sun City can continue after dark, Community Patrol will not ticket trash cans until after 8:00 a.m. on the morning after scheduled collection.
- If you receive this magazine before the last day of January, be sure to attend a Town Hall meeting in Speakers Hall on January 31 at 11:00 a.m. Burrtec will discuss the arrival of a new 36-gallon green trash bin to be used for organic waste. The program will begin rolling out in February.
- The effort to reduce speeding in Sun City is succeeding. There has been a reduction in speeding citations.
- The HOA has begun cleaning up the drift sand, installing new irrigation, and replacing plants on Washington. The crew will move on to Coyote Song when Washington is completed.
- CVWD now has funding to continue main waterline replacement beginning in September. This will affect District 6 and District 7. CVWD will begin digging holes in the asphalt in February to determine utility layers.
- The solar project continues according to plan despite a delay in receiving the last of the solar panels. Completion of the physical project is expected in May. IID will then inspect and allow connection.
- There is new uplighting installed now at the main entrance.

The following interviews offer a "Behind the Scenes" look at the News & Views team...

Cynthia Gunn

Our wonderful editor, Cindy Gunn, grew up in Michigan and has a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree. She moved to New York City after being hired straight out of art school to paint for a renowned Soho artist. She then spent over 20 years working in the pharmaceutical advertising industry for various agencies, winning two coveted Rx Awards for design. With the advent of computers in advertising, she was named Director of Computer Graphics for Sudler & Hennessey New

York, a healthcare communications agency, and subsequently became Director of IT for Sudler & Hennessey Worldwide.

Cindy moved to La Quinta in 2001, two weeks after 9/11, resuming her freelance design career with work for various local country clubs and resorts, including the La Quinta Resort, The Citrus Club and PGA West. In 2009, Del Webb's Marketing Director encouraged her to apply for the design contract for Sun City Shadow Hills' publication to bring it up to Del Webb standards, taking it from a newsletter to a magazine. By 2012, she was contracted by Sun City Palm Desert to improve their *News & Views* publication as well.



Cindy's contract with SCPD expanded her responsibilities beyond design, layout and production to include the title of editor. February marks her 151st issue of *News & Views*.

Cindy says, "Working with the talented *News & Views* team of writers, photographer and recording secretary has been a tremendously rewarding experience. Their teamwork is exceptional and inspiring, producing high quality content for their readers every month, which challenges me to continue doing my best work."

Putting out a monthly magazine entails the dedicated work of many people. Here is a glimpse "Behind the Scenes" of our excellent *News & Views* publication.

With a deadline for submissions one month prior to the issue of the magazine, SCPDCA personnel, Committees, Clubs and Resident Groups submit monthly reports, photos and other information to Cindy based on the annual editorial calendar she creates. *News & Views* writers submit monthly columns, resident profiles, general interest features and *Writers' Corner* pieces, and Cindy finds photos or graphics to visually enhance their content. Cindy also coordinates the submission of all resident contest entries. Paid advertising, promotions, event and calendar listings, and other HOA information is supplied to Cindy by Sun City staff.

Working with page layout software, Cindy assembles all the content each month into a template she has created over the years specifically for *News & Views*, with placeholders for everything on the editorial calendar. When each month's layout is complete, she sends a proof to SCPDCA personnel for review and approval to send to print. When approval is received, Cindy sends all the files (layout, artwork and fonts) to the printer. The printer then performs a prepress check and creates a digital proof which is sent to Cindy and SCPDCA personnel for final "print as is" approval before printing over 5,000 copies of the magazine. The magazines are delivered on the last morning of each month for distribution by each District's dedicated resident-volunteers to every household in the community.

We are all very fortunate to have Cindy overseeing our excellent *News & Views* magazine.

Seeking solace from our divisions, we took refuge in groups. Drawn by the allure of belonging, we often succumbed to herd mentality, suppressing individuality for the illusion of safety and strength in numbers. These

groups, while offering belonging, also demanded conformity, leading many to abandon their true selves.

Wearing masks of civility, we hid behind veils of politeness and pretense. We laughed at jokes we didn't find funny and agreed with opinions we honestly didn't share. These gratuitous gestures wove a fragile illusion of connection, born more from a fear of offending and being ostracized than from camaraderie.

This fear held the group together, but it also kept us apart. Conforming to others' expectations, we sacrificed our identities for the comfort of superficial interactions, trading authenticity for approval and gradually losing sight of who we truly were. Beneath the masks we wore lay a deeper truth—vulnerability. Past experience taught revealing flaws would be seen as weaknesses, making us targets for ridicule or rejection. By hiding imperfections, we shielded ourselves from pain but forfeited the chance for meaningful bonds.

Our lives brimmed with shallow relationships, but few carried the depth we yearned for. If only we had the courage to shatter the facades of conformity. If only we had the grace to accept those who did.

In the end, we remained strangers—to each other and to ourselves—haunted by the quiet ache of what might have been.

The Wager: A Tale of Shipwreck, Mutiny and Murder

By David Grann

Grann's new nonfiction book reads like a thriller set in the 1740s, when Spain and England sent shiploads of men to fight on the high seas, vying to conquer, control the world's mineral riches, and bring the wealth home, wealth created by enslaved peoples.

The Wager, a British ship with 250 officers and crew, carried munitions for a squadron of six warships. The squadron set sail in September 1740 "on a secret mission: to capture a treasure-filled Spanish galleon known as the prize of all the oceans." Crews of this time included men impressed into service, invalids pulled from pensioners' homes, second sons without better prospects and dozens of young boys. "Press gangs headed out...scouring the horizon for incoming merchant ships—the most fertile hunting ground" for men.

In addition to the ship being overly crowded, bad weather, bad decisions, an outbreak of typhoid spread by lice even before the ship left port, and other disasters followed the ship around Cape Horn, possibly the most dangerous water in the world. On the voyage, scurvy decimated the crew. Rats and worms ate the ship and its stores. Hurricane winds ripped the sails. *Dead reckoning* was a poor tool for navigation.

"So miserable was the scene that words cannot express the misery that some of the men died in."

In May, the Wager wrecked off the coast of Patagonia. By then half the crew had died. The surviving 145 castaways, all in poor health, managed to salvage supplies from the wrecked ship. Stranded for months, food was scarce, although the men ate a wild celery that cured their scurvy. The threat of starvation growing, most of the crew wanting to go home decided to build a boat and leave the island, sail through the Straits of Magellan and land in Brazil, which they manage to do. Six months later, another boat washed ashore in

southwestern Chili. The men aboard claimed the men who'd landed in Brazil were mutineers.

"The principal figures from each group...were now summoned by the Admiralty to face a court-martial. The trial threatened to expose the secret nature not only of those charged but also of an empire whose self-professed mission was spreading civilization."

The Wedding People

By Alison Espach

This novel begins with Phoebe arriving "at the grand Cornwall Inn wearing a green dress and gold heels, not a bag in sight, alone. She's immediately mistaken by everyone in the lobby for one of the wedding people, but she's actually the only guest at the Cornwall who isn't here for the big event."

Lila, the bride, has planned to the smallest detail a sumptuous, very expensive wedding. She has planned for everything except Phoebe, who has come to the hotel to take her cat's painkillers.

"Phoebe does not want to feel rushed. She does not want to go out frantic and through a window like Septimus in *Mrs. Dalloway*, a scene that upset her so much, it became the only book in graduate school that she never finished reading."

As Phoebe contemplates her life there is a knock on her door and the bride enters, catching Phoebe smoking a cigarette. Lila talks louder than she needs to...and Phoebe wonders what the bride does for a living. Is Lila an actress who has to project her voice? "Maybe she is an airline attendant, good at announcing things to forty-seven passengers."

With every wedding event and interaction come more reasons for Phoebe to live. Espach's literary novel is, at its core, about how even small interactions with people can change your life and that we need those people to feel like we're actually living.



The Snake – Your year could be challenging if you are a Snake, so trade bad luck for good luck by wearing something red all year. Fortunately, it's one of my favorite colors.

Farfalle con Cipolla, Piselli e Pancetta

Serves four

- 1 lb. Farfalle pasta
- 1 medium sweet onion, chopped
- 1 lb. frozen petite peas
- 10 oz. thick-cut pancetta or bacon, diced to 1/8"
- 6 oz. freshly-grated Parmigiano Reggiano
- 2–3 tablespoons Extra Virgin Olive Oil
- Salt and Pepper to taste,
- Sprigs of parsley

Put a large pot of water on stove over high heat.

Pour 1 cup of water in a small pot and bring to a boil. Add pinch of salt and peas; return to a boil. Simmer and cook until tender.

Place onion and pancetta in a large, deep pan with 2–3 Tbs EVOO over medium heat and stir until the pancetta and onions are deep golden brown.

Drain the peas (reserving some of the water) and add to the onion and pancetta with some water. Add salt and pepper, lower the heat, cover and cook for 25–30 minutes. Stir frequently, adding more warm water if necessary.

When the large pot of water is boiling, add salt and pasta, cooking until al dente.

Spoon cooked pasta and ½-cup of pasta water into the pan with other ingredients (the most crucial part of the recipe).

Continue stirring over low heat, while alternately adding the parmigiano with a touch of pasta water until all the parmigiano is melted, creating an emulsion-like effect.

Serve topped with more parmigiano and a parsley sprig. *Buon Appetito!*

The featured winery was Hartford Court, a family-owned winery located in the Russian River area of Sonoma County. Hartford Court specializes in making wine from single vineyard sites with limited bottling unlike many of the large, mass produced wineries. The first wine served at the dinner was a 2023 Chardonnay, paired with a baked mini lobster tail stuffed with fresh seafood topped with panko and butter.

The main course was served with three wines: a 2022 Pino Noir Lands Edge, with a 92-point rating on Wine Enthusiast; a 2022 Russian River Pino Noir, with a 90-point rating; and a 2022 Old Vine Zinfandel, with a 92-point rating. These wines were selected specifically to be served with a hickory smoked duck breast with winter vegetables, fig citrus relish and a port wine reduction sauce. The dessert was sticky date pudding with caramel sauce.

Because our classes are now crowded, please do not bring guests during the months of February and March. This applies to Mat and Chair Yoga and Pilates.

A good thing about yoga is that there are several types, two of which are Hatha Yoga (traditional poses, slow-paced stretches and breathwork to balance the body and mind) and Vinyasa Yoga (a more flowing and creative style). Our instructors mix the yoga formats, and any pose or stretch can be modified due to injury or ability.

We also offer Pilates which focuses on strengthening and toning the body, especially the core muscles. Gyrotonics is incorporated into our Pilates program and is a series of fluid, circular movements that strengthens, stretches and improves flexibility throughout the body.

Unlimited classes are \$30 monthly; single classes are \$5 each. The first class is free. Annual membership fee is \$25.

Don't be late. Classes start on time, and we close the doors.
