

# **Operations Update**

It feels Sun City has been in overdrive since I joined the team this past February. With special projects leading the way, one of my main concerns continues to be public safety, patrol and transparency through communications. I understand that no system is perfect or foolproof, however with community support and member participation we can do our best to make Sun City a safe place to live.

Most recently, Dan Oates joined the Public Safety Committee as Chair and Randy Dugger acts as the Board Liaison for the Committee as well as the Board President for Sun City. The Committee has made several changes including meeting monthly from September through May to allow for better continuity and consistency during season. We have already had several collaborative meetings where the Committee has acknowledged concerns and made recommendations to the Board. The most recent project completion was striping the cross walk at Sunrise Mountain View.

Additional meetings between me, our Director of Patrol and General Maintenance Director also took place to evaluate installation of solar flashing signs that will be going in near Arbor Glen as you approach Ryan's Way at Links to help slow traffic as residents approach a blind curve. Signs have been ordered, however the vendor providing the signage has informed our department there is a 12-week lead time for receipt of those signs. The signs will be installed as soon as received.

Prior to Thanksgiving, the three of us met near the baseball field off Mojave Sage to evaluate additional traffic calming measures, as well as the potential for the addition of a stop sign as recommended by the Public Safety Committee. This item will most likely show up in our January Board meeting for action once all resources and costs have been evaluated.

The Public Safety Committee hosted the Riverside County Sheriff Department, Police Department and Fire Department at the Community Expo where Clubs, Committees, and Resident Groups came together to inform owners of all the great opportunities available to Sun City residents. During this time, we learned 911 is being used for non-emergency issues such as fire alarm battery change out requests and leaking faucets. Please note that 911 should *only* be used for life threatening emergencies. There are volunteers within Sun City who can assist you with these home projects, such as Neighbors 4 Neighbors, which offers a program to help owners change out their batteries. You may contact their hotline number to leave a message for assistance by calling 760-592-9864. Please reach out to your Delegate Representative if you have any questions.

Please continue to be safe while on property, please observe all traffic signs and calming measures placed throughout the property. Most importantly, please enjoy yourself and all Sun City has to offer you!

I hope you all had a wonderful holiday season.

# FINANCIAL REPORT

THROUGH OCTOBER 2024



The October 2024 financials were presented to the Finance Committee on Wednesday, November 27.

October finished the month up \$66K to budget, \$95K actual vs. \$29K budget. Golf Shop revenue is down and missed budget in October by (\$28K), \$314K actual vs. \$342K budget. Golf rounds for October are down (387) along with revenues

down (\$18K) for the month. YTD, Golf Shop is (\$94K) down budget. The extreme high summer temperatures contributed to the decline in golf play by (1,493) rounds vs. budget for the first four months of the Fiscal Year.

Food & Beverage revenues are down to budget by (\$28K) for the month of October, \$258K actual vs. \$286K budget. Daily Grind is down (\$0.8K), Catering is up \$12K, and Boulevards is down (\$39K). The Food & Beverage Department did manage their flow-thru of expenses in Boulevards. With revenues being down (\$39K), they decreased \$16K on their cost of sales and \$44K on their salary and wages. Boulevards finished the month with a loss of (\$16K) actual vs. (\$40K) budget, which is \$24K better than budget. Boulevards remains closed on Mondays.

As of November 25, HR has 21 positions on their Open Positions Report. These open positions include 15 Food & Beverage positions, two Facilities Maintenance positions and four Golf Course Maintenance position. Out of the 15 open positions in Food & Beverage, ten of these positions are simply "on call" positions that are open.

There were 25 homes that closed escrow in the month of October. Reserve Replenishment Assessment (RRA) revenue is \$64,722 for October and fiscal year-to-date revenues are \$243,742.

Rolling forecasts were prepared this month including four months actual and eight months forecast. Currently, we are on track to make budget for the fiscal year.

The Association remains in a sound financial position.

**24-12-101** – A motion to approve the purchase and installation of a new gate barrier arm operator by InterAccess Systems, for an amount not to exceed \$ 8,921, to be funded by proceeds from an insurance claim for the replacement of a damaged gate barrier arm operator. 



# **Public Safety Committee**

I have written articles on various safety issues the past year but have decided this article would be written on miscellaneous issues I have seen within Del Webb Sun City.

- 1. Drivers not using turn signals when changing lanes. The California Vehicle Code requires all drivers to signal at least 100 feet prior to making a turn or changing lanes. This section states: Any signal of intention to turn right or left shall be given continuously during the last 100 feet traveled by the vehicle turning.
- 2. Drivers not yielding to pedestrians crossing the roadway within any marked or unmarked crosswalk at any intersection. Pedestrians *always* have the right of way.
- 3. Drivers backing out of a driveway and not yielding to walkers or other cars. This is a very common problem in our community. Most of the time, the person driving on the road or the walkers will yield to the car backing out of the driveway. Either the driver is in too big of a hurry or does not use their backup camera. Look first, use your backup camera, and yield to cars and walkers.
- 4. Vehicles exceeding the speed limit of 25 MPH on residential streets. Watch your speed and be aware of the 25 MPH speed limit. Be sure to tell workers, guests and family members who come to your home the consequences of excessive speed over 25 MPH on residential streets and 35 MPH on Del Webb will be tickets and fines. I'm sure we've all caught ourselves speeding on 38th Avenue. We should be aware it is our duty to ourselves and the community to be mindful of our speed and stay within the posted speed limits.
- 5. If you drive your golf cart after sunset, ensure your headlights are working and turned on.
- 6. Don't drive your golf cart with children in your lap. Don't let your small, precious ones drive the golf cart. Yes, we understand that's cute and adorable, but their lives are too precious to take a chance.
- 7. Always get home safely and be sure to close the garage door. Before you go to bed, lock the door leading into the house.

Happy New Year...a great time for new beginnings! This year the LEC will be making some amendments to our Design Guidelines and want to give you a "heads up" about some of the changes we are discussing. And don't worry, you will have plenty of opportunities to express your opinion.

It's been over five years since our last Design Guideline update. At that time, we made major changes and reorganized the entire document. The new proposed changes will be minor in nature and will provide homeowners additional flexibility for home improvements.

We are considering adding some new items to stay up to date with current design trends in landscaping, paint and home improvements. Some of the updates we are discussing include:

- Aluminum covers for mini-split air conditioners (a more attractive and durable alternative than lattice)
- Sound barriers that look like walls and help reduce loud equipment noise
- Shade structures for privacy lots
- Mesh covers for gates, fences and patio covers
- · Small glass windows for garage doors
- Expanded use of decomposed granite

Additionally, we are recommending a new color pallet for homes, featuring new schemes for more contrast and some lighter schemes, which residents have requested.

# lt's all about

A disaster occurs, first responders rush to their appointed posts and one of the first things they need is the ability to communicate—to know what is happening, to make good decisions, to direct response. This is so crucial that good planning includes redundancy and backup systems. This is a story that started out 30 years ago in a small shed behind Engineering and through persistence and dedication to providing disaster aid to our community has morphed into what it is today. Currently the Emergency Preparedness Committee (EPC) operates the following systems: 2-way licensed radios to communicate with the 36 District Command Posts and 8 emergency support teams, HAM amateur radio operations, a satellite phone and a drone for air support. We are also the only HOA in the Coachella Valley to have an emergency broadcast radio station AM 1620, as well as a direct disaster net radio to Riverside County Emergency Operations Center. This gives us the ability to gather crucial information in the community, react to it and communicate with the Riverside County Emergency Operations Center for aid.



The Director of our Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is Scott Morse, who knows more about radios than most anyone. He comes to us from Santa Clara & Contra Costa County's Emergency Management with experience from the Loma Prieta earthquake in 1989. He also is a member of RACES in the Coachella Valley, the Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service known as HAM Radio. Scott not only provides technical knowledge to our group but also has valuable connections to Riverside County Emergency Management Department. He has been instrumental in outfitting our new Mobile Emergency Operations Center (MEOC). The MEOC

provides us with a backup if the main EOC is damaged and it can also be relocated to an area with heavy damage that requires onsite leadership/communications. The MEOC has its own on-board generator and air conditioning. Sun City Palm Desert was fortunate to receive not only the MEOC but two additional emergency supply trailers which were a part of a grant from the California State Emergency Department.

### 2 way radio

2-Way Radio is our biggest communication group. Each of our 36 designated Command Posts has a 2-way radio which connects with one of three designated radio channels in the EOC. The way this works is a call comes in from a Command Post radio channel to the

Radio Team member handling that area. If a Search and Rescue or Medical team is required, the message goes immediately to them for follow up. Equipment requires operators, so lets introduce you to some of our talented team. Below right are some of our Radio Team members, lead by Dan Oates. Dan retired after 30 years service with the San Mateo County Sheriff's office. He is a licensed HAM and is chair of the Public Safety Committee here in Sun City. Like many of the EPC volunteers, Dan and his wife are also involved with various community charity work. Meet Pam Garvin, the Alternate Lead for the Radio Team. Pam worked for LA Police Department in communications for close to 20 years, taking 911 calls from residents and screening/prioritizing those calls.

Duties also included dispatch, as the voice police officers spoke to when routinely handling situations such as vehicle pursuits, shootings and officers in need of assistance. She also trained dispatchers, the new 911 operators and then those who wanted to be a trainer. Pam would like you to know that if you are interested in volunteering, please let us know. Experience isn't necessary, just a desire to serve our community as a volunteer in a time of need. Contact us at scpdeoc@gmail.com to volunteer.









Amateur radio dates back to the early 1900s. It began and has stayed as an experimental service with independent thinking volunteers who found ways to communicate after normal ways failed. HAMs have made significant contributions to science, engineering, industry and social services. Today they remain on the cutting edge of a technology which allows communication with one another anywhere in the world with simply a handheld digital transceiver. Robert Tucker leads the EPC HAM Radio Team. He has volunteered over 20,000 hours with the LA County Sheriff Department Reserve Forces, attended FBI Citizens Academy and was a founding member of DEA Citizens Academy. As a certified FEMA

Emergency Program Manager and ICS (Incident Command System) trainer, Robert specializes in management of disasters, particularly in improving their communication during major incidences. He developed training programs across LA County, spearheaded the Rapid Response Team at the LA County Emergency Operations Bureau and coordinated communications during major disasters (from the Mandeville Canyon floods of 1970 to the Catalina and Malibu fires in the 2000s).

<u>HAM Health & Welfare Messages</u>. This is something HAM can do to help you reach your loved ones in a disaster that you might not heard of. These messages now go computer to computer via amateur radio which is capable of handling more messages and faster than person to person. After a disaster and once the situation has stabilized a bit, we will notify residents via AM 1620 where to bring their messages. It should go to one out-of-state person designated to relay it. You will need their name, address, phone number and most important, their <u>email address</u>. Keep this info on you in writing as cell phones may be useless. Message limit is 25 words and no return replies.





Al Hopwood is Team Lead for AM 1620, our own low-powered radio broadcast system. It is staffed with volunteers who combined, have more than 50 years of radio and television news gathering experience. Their goal is to give you peace of mind by sharing with you what you need to know in order to remain safe during any emergency. AM 1620 is there, running 24/7. Usually you hear a generic prerecorded announcement. During a major event, you will also hear a prerecorded announcement but it is changed to be pertinent to the specific event. But also during the hour there will be live updates with new developments. The flashing lights on Del Webb near the 3 clubhouses signal that activation has occurred or a practice drill is in progress.

New this year is the Air Support Team, led by Ron Armour and his drone. Ron is a certified and experienced drone pilot. When activated during a disaster, the drone can provide our Incident Command with a quick visual of concerned areas, such as our perimeter gates, bridges that might be down, roofs that have collapsed, roads, suspicious smoke. It can hover over an area to be evacuated and then transmit voice messages to those below. It can be sent to observe areas which might be dangerous



A great deal of thought, effort and experimentation have gone into designing a workable system for Sun City's EPC disaster communication systems. Our Team Leaders are always considering any technology which might improve our response abilities. New technology surfaces, sometimes at a higher cost. The reliability, durability, maintenance and user friendliness of a product all have to be considered. We are so fortunate now to have some highly qualified volunteers to shape our programs. Over time what sustains the effort to improve SCPD's disaster response is our teams and their ability to work together. To volunteer to help us, contact scpdeoc@gmail.com

### Relax your way to lower blood pressure

The easiest way to lower blood pressure is to pop a pill. But pills cost money and often have side effects. Fully relaxing your body and your mind for a few minutes a day could lower your systolic blood pressure (the top number of a blood pressure reading) by 10 points or more—at no cost, and with no side effects.

Researchers with Benson-Henry Institute for Mind-Body Medicine compared a stress management technique called the relaxation response with lifestyle changes such as sodium reduction, weight loss and exercise. They found:

- Blood pressure decreased more in the relaxation response group.
- 32% of the volunteers in that group were able to eliminate one blood pressure medication and still keep their blood pressure under control, compared with only 14% of the lifestyle group.

The relaxation response has been shown to reduce heart rate, blood pressure, breathing rate and muscle tension. Here's how to do it:

- Select a word (such as "one" or "peace"), a short phrase, or a prayer to focus on.
- Sit quietly in a comfortable position and close your eyes.
- Relax your muscles, progressing from your feet to your calves, thighs, abdomen, etc., up to your neck and face.
- Breathe slowly through your nose, silently saying your focus word, phrase, or prayer to yourself as you exhale.
- When other thoughts come to mind, don't worry. Simply return your attention to your focus word, phrase or prayer.
- Do this for 10–20 minutes.
- Sit quietly for a minute or so, then open your eyes.
- Practice the relaxation response once or twice a day.

#### **Blood Pressure Basics**

Blood pressure is the force that a wave of blood propelled from the heart exerts on the arteries. It is measured at two points; each recorded in millimeters of mercury (mm Hg).

Systolic pressure gauges the pressure in the arteries at systole (SIS-tuh-lee), the instant the heart contracts and pushes blood along the arterial tree (think "s" for squeeze). It is the top number of a blood pressure reading.

Diastolic pressure reflects the pressure during diastole (die-AS-tuh-lee), the brief period of relaxation between beats. It is the bottom number of a blood pressure reading.

Hypertension is the formal name for high blood pressure.

#### **Blood Pressure Categories**

	<b>Systolic</b>		Diastolic
Normal (optimal)	less than 120	and	less than 80
Pre-hypertension	120 - 139	or	80 - 89
Hypertension	140 or higher	or	90 or higher

#### Hypertension Symptoms

High blood pressure is often called a silent killer because it may have no symptoms for years. One in five people with the condition do not know they have it while it can be damaging the heart, lungs, blood vessels, brain and kidneys. Untreated, it is a major risk factor for strokes and heart attacks.

#### The Hypertension Danger Zone

You have hypertension if readings average140/90 or higher —for either number—though you may have no symptoms. At 180/110 and higher, you may have a hypertensive crisis. Rest for a few minutes and take your blood pressure again. If still very high, call 911. A hypertensive crisis can lead to a stroke, heart attack, kidney damage or loss of consciousness. Symptoms of a hypertensive crisis can include a severe headache, anxiety, nosebleeds and feeling short of breath.

# Golf Course NEWS

What a year it has been. Summer temperatures soared over 110°F more than 55 times, a dramatic increase from the 35 days recorded last year—and far higher than in previous years. For those of us who live and work here year-round, this summer was especially difficult. There were moments when I found myself questioning, *what am I doing here?* The relentless heat took its toll, but as we entered November I realized, as tough as the heat was, it's still better than shoveling snow and battling freezing temperatures.

With rising temperatures becoming the norm, what does this mean for us in the long term? The effects are already noticeable. Our Bermuda grass, typically dormant during the cooler months, is growing longer and thriving in the extended heat. This presents new challenges, particularly when it comes to overseeding. Overseeding requires us to manage both the Bermuda grass and the ryegrass, which is a delicate balance. The extreme temperatures force us to rely more heavily on growth regulators, herbicides, and fungicides to control the competing grasses. This, in turn, leads to an increase in grass clippings, adding to the workload and placing additional stress on equipment.

One period, from September to October, has become especially taxing. Between dealing with the constant influx of grass clippings—often finding their way into my ears, nose and eyes—combating allergies, handling the occasional water overflow complaints from homeowners, and cleaning dust and clippings from the pool, I've found this time of year to be particularly challenging. The question remains, *"What can be done to alleviate these issues?"*  Three years ago, as Clint Atherton humorously dubbed me a "mad scientist," I began researching alternative solutions to avoid the need for overseeding altogether. This led to a collaboration with Oklahoma State University to test various Bermuda grass varieties, but none seemed suitable for the long-term needs of our region. Then, I turned to the USGA to explore a new variety of grass—Zoysia—that had never been used on the West Coast.

The initial trial started last year, when we sodded 2,000 square feet of Zoysia on hole 6. The results were promising, so this past summer, we expanded the experiment, planting an entire acre of Zoysia on the same hole. As we approach December, I'm pleased to report that the Zoysia is holding up well, maintaining excellent color and health even in the colder months. (See photo below for a glimpse of its progress.)



Joe Johnson and I will present our findings and discuss the future of Zoysia grass on January 9 at 2 p.m. in Speakers Hall. We will share insights on our experience with this new grass variety and outline potential plans for expanding its use. Our ultimate goal is to reduce water usage, minimize dust, and eliminate the challenges that arise during the fall overseeding process.

I invite all who are interested in the future of turfgrass management to join us for this important presentation. Your feedback and insights are invaluable as we work toward creating a more sustainable, efficient solution for the challenges we face on the course. Together, we can help shape the future of turf management in our region.

There are many good causes to donate to, but scammers are pros at tricking people into opening their wallets for false charities. To be sure your dollars go towards supporting legitimate causes follow these tips:

- Don't be rushed, especially over the phone.
- Research the charity. Search the name plus "complaint" or "scam."
- Don't trust caller ID.
- Check the charity's website. Does it give lots of details?
- Watch how you pay. If asked to use cryptocurrency, Western Union, MoneyGram, a payment app or gift card, it may be a scam. A credit card or check is safer.

• The District Meeting started with a presentation by a representative from the Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC). This organization is not a branch of the county, but is a stand-alone commission funded by the 0.5% sales tax approved by County Measure A. The purpose of RCTC is to improve all forms of transportation in Riverside County. Currently all funds approved by Measure A are already earmarked for current projects.

The RCTC representative suggested that we all go to their website, rctc.org, to see the projects they are currently funding and consider sending letters to our state representatives regarding the difficulties existing state agencies may create in funding traffic relief projects in our valley.

- The LEC may give us our first look at the new house paint schemes in January.
- The Emergency Preparedness Committee will hold a drill on February 21.
- The Association is looking at the possibility of adding additional stop signs at particularly dangerous intersections. None of these would be on Del Webb. Additional lighting and painting are being considered for crosswalks.
- A flashing solar sign will be installed on Ryans Way to warn of a blind curve.
- The CVWD projects affecting the Pineknoll and Brandywine greenbelts are completed. Trees and turf have been replaced. Concrete staining and new fencing are underway. Anticipate the reopening of the Pineknoll dog park in January.
- We are reminded that winter is coming and when temperatures drop below 40 degrees golf carts can damage the new grass. Golfers are requested to get the course conditions app at the App Store to get updates on any changes.
- The major construction on the parking lots for the solar project is completed. There will be future brief disruptions for the installation of the electrical connections. The solar for the cart barn near the bocce courts is underway. We may anticipate full completion of the solar project in May.
- The parking area on the west end of the Lake View Recreation Center will be redesigned to add four additional ADA parking spaces. Those spaces had been removed because they blocked emergency vehicle access. The parking area will be extended to accommodate the ADA spaces.
- Boulevards remains closed on Mondays. There are 15 open positions to be filled for the Food & Beverage Department.
- We are reminded that 911 is *only* for emergencies, not because our smoke detectors need new batteries or when we have a water leak.
- The next New Resident Orientation (NRO) will be on January 21 at 10 a.m. in the Ventana Room.
- The Events Set Up Department will have a new home inside the Mountain View Clubhouse. They will close the temporary trailer currently in use.

# From Riches to Rags and Back Again

In the heart of Shanghai, China, stood a beacon of luxury the estate of Mennie Wong's parents. She and her five siblings lived in this sanctuary of wealth. Maids and butlers were as common as the lavish parties that filled the evenings. Mennie's father, an industry titan, ran a uniform manufacturing empire, employing over 6,000 workers, even supplying uniforms to companies like Shell Oil in the U.S.

But in 1957, winds of change swept through China. The Anti-Rightist Movement, targeting intellectuals and capitalists, cast a dark shadow over the Wongs. Mennie's father, who was accused of holding views contrary to Communist ideals, was imprisoned and spent the next five years in hard labor.

As the government tightened its grip, the Wongs watched helplessly as their business, home, and wealth were taken from them. Their grand mansion became a distant memory. Mennie, her mother, and five siblings were relegated to the cramped maid's quarters—a mere 500 square feet with a single bathroom.

While grappling with this new reality, another disaster loomed. In 1958, the Great Chinese Famine began its brutal siege. Shanghai, though better off than most regions, still faced hunger. Each person's monthly ration consisted of four ounces of oil, a handful of sugar, a meager portion of rice, and five pounds of sweet potatoes. Their meals, often just the outer leaves of a cabbage head—served as a bitter reminder of the abundance they once knew.

At just 19, Mennie left Shanghai for the first time, leaving behind her family and everything she knew. For a year, her aunt had been writing letters to the Chinese government, seeking permission for Mennie to join her in Hong Kong as a caregiver, but her requests were to no avail. In 1961, her aunt traveled to Shanghai to help plan her escape.

By 1962, the plan was in motion. After a grueling 36-hour train ride to Canton, Mennie stood alone on the platform, overwhelmed with loneliness. As she tried to gather her bearings, a woman named Miss Mao approached and asked, "Are you alone? Do you have money?"

Mennie wore a money belt her mother had sewn for the journey. Miss Mao led her to a cramped, dingy hotel room with one bed, where Mennie slept squeezed between the wall and a woman with a sour temperament and overpowering odor. Miss Mao and another hopeful escapee stayed in an adjoining room.

The foursome took turns standing in line, six hours at a time, to keep their place. They were waiting to catch a boat to Macau—the first step in their journey toward freedom in British-controlled Hong Kong.

On the fourth day, tired of looking like a weary traveler, Mennie treated herself to a makeover—hair styled, a white dress, and bright red block heels. Dressed up, she stood out in line like a fresh flower in a field of withering weeds. After just an hour, a tall, well-dressed man walked by, staring at her. Mennie felt frightened. He hesitated, turned away, but then came back and asked, "Are you alone? Do you have money?"

The man, Chief Wayne Loung, a government harbor official, handed her his card. He encouraged her to forget her friends and meet him at his office the next morning at 9 a.m. Without an alarm clock, Mennie was too nervous to sleep. She snuck out at dawn and walked 22 blocks in her new heels, arriving at his office right on time.

Loung explained how her innocent look and impractical outfit had caught his attention—and likely saved her life. He warned her standing in line at the harbor was dangerous, with rapes and murders all too common. People often waited a year for their chance to escape, but Mennie had been lucky. Her unusual appearance had made all the difference.

Chief Loung gave Mennie strict instructions: take only three dollars because any more would risk arrest. He handed her a fake passport that identified her as a sugar trader. For exactly three dollars, he sold her a ticket to Macau. He also introduced her to a "snakehead"—a smuggler who specialized in helping people escape mainland China. Mennie still recalls that boat ride as one of the luckiest turning points of her life.

Mennie's aunt traveled to Macau and stayed three days helping to arrange the final leg of her escape. To help ensure Mennie's safe passage across the harbor to Hong Kong, her aunt paid another snakehead double the usual ten-dollar fee.

Coincidentally, years later in Hong Kong, Mennie ran into Miss Mao, who was shocked to see her alive. Miss Mao explained that after her disappearance, fearing the worst, they had filed a missing person report. When Mennie shared her escape story, Miss Mao revealed it took another eight months of waiting in line before she and the others finally made it to Hong Kong.

Mennie spoke Mandarin but to adapt to her new life, she had to learn Cantonese. She found a job managing the gift shop at the Ritz-Carlton, where she not only mastered the language but also met her future husband, Chris Abelardo.

Chris was a talented music arranger for the iconic Shaw Brothers film studio, often referred to as the Universal Studios of Asia. An accomplished bassist, he regularly played with legends like Louis Armstrong and Matt Monro, who always requested Chris when performing at the Hong Kong Hilton.

Chris visited Mennie's shop daily, buying five or six packs of cigarettes. Concerned for his health, Mennie thought, "*At this rate, he'll kill himself*." As it turned out, the cigarettes were just an excuse to see her.

They married in 1963. Their life together blossomed. In 1964, with the Chinese Cultural Revolution looming, they welcomed their first son. Two years later, they welcomed a second son.

In 1968, Mennie and Chris emigrated to the United States. They planned to join Chris's parents in Florida, but a stopover in Los Angeles changed everything. When Mennie called their former neighbors, the Lees—now living in Palm Springs and owners of the Rainbow Room, Coachella Valley's second Chinese restaurant—they insisted the couple visit. Within days, Mennie and Chris fell in love with the desert oasis and decided to stay. Palm Springs became the perfect backdrop for Mennie's entrepreneurial spirit.

Soon after settling in, Mennie landed a job as a gofer at the offices of renowned orthopedic specialists Drs. Danielson

and Baldwin. Her dedication to even the smallest tasks set her apart. She escorted patients to exam rooms, often using an electric massager to relax their backs.

In 1969, Mennie treated a particularly famous patient. After finishing her routine, she stepped out of the exam room and found her coworkers buzzing with excitement. "I can't believe you got to give Elvis a massage!" Did you get his autograph?" they gushed.

Mennie maintained her professional demeanor. "Elvis? Just another patient." Though she couldn't forget the thrill of hearing him say, in that unmistakable Southern drawl, "Thank you very much."

Inspired by the Lees, Mennie soon opened the Hong Kong Restaurant, the third Chinese eatery in the Valley, attracting a star-studded clientele. Building on her success, she followed with the House of Bamboo in Rancho Mirage, further solidifying her place in the local dining scene.

> In 1983, Mennie launched Nonchalance, a supper club featuring live entertainment. Then came Maxim's, a French restaurant that graced the Palm Desert Mall during its grand opening. "French food is less labor-intensive," Mennie remarked, "because Chinese cooking requires chopping vegetables all day." She managed both establishments until 1988, when she sold them and retired.

> With two of the Valley's premier Chinese restaurants, Mennie catered to A-list stars like Bob Hope, Elizabeth Taylor and Frank Sinatra. She attended parties at Bob Hope's estate. He always affectionately called her "Miss Hong Kong", but when he asked her to cater one of his events, she declined, laughing, "He always came with a crowd, but he never paid the bill."

One memorable day Telly Savalas wandered

into Mennie's Hong Kong Restaurant, located next to Peter Epsteen's Rolls-Royce dealership. Savalas had just bought a new Rolls and was killing time while it was being prepped. Shirtless and shoeless, he seemed unfazed by the restaurant's strict dress code. Mennie simply pointed to her sign: *No Shoes, No Shirt, No Service.* Undeterred, Savalas borrowed a too-small shirt and ill-fitting shoes from the dealership. "Nowww, can I come in?" Mennie chuckles at the memory. "Who shops for a Rolls half-naked?"

From that grand Shanghai mansion, Mennie's journey is nothing short of remarkable. Surviving one of history's darkest chapters, she has carved out a full life through sheer determination, hard work and a bit of luck—demonstrating the indomitable strength of the human spirit. Shaped by both privilege and hardship, her story is a powerful reminder of the resilience within us all to persevere and prevail.

This is part three of the "Behind the Scenes" series *News & Views* has published to bring more information to our residents on the unseen effort that goes into running a successful community, bringing into focus the parts that make the "SCPD Big Machine" work.

This segment is dedicated to the "hardscapes" of Sun City. We usually don't stop to admire buildings or roadways the same way we admire a manicured fairway or flowers.

Like perhaps many of you, I didn't know what the word "hardscapes" really comprised. One day I sat down with Travis Radtke, SCPD's General Maintenance Director, and got a good education on the many activities that go on behind the scenes.

Travis oversees the maintenance of all of SCPD's public buildings, from the ground to the roof, and every nut and bolt and screw and bulb and faucet and frame (I am sure I forgot many other "things") that are in them! Travis oversees seven departments, which also includes the fitness centers, swimming pools, pickleball and tennis courts, the "hardscape" of the softball field, the community's perimeter walls and, of course, all street surfaces, sidewalks and golf comfort stations. Accordingly, Travis manages many of the "emergency calls" with different employees; 18 engineers, 18 housekeepers and 20 fitness centers employees. Some of Travis's most recurring concerns are the state of the "hardscapes" which need constant monitoring. Just like Tyler Truman watches over the SCPD "greenscapes," Travis has a detailed agenda regarding the repaving of the roads, inspection of the roofs, and maintenance of each building and air conditioning system. Many of the big maintenance tasks are subcontracted to external, specialized companies, and Travis is constantly monitoring the inspection times and dates for their optimal upkeep and damage prevention.

In recent months Travis has been overseeing multiple major projects, including the construction of the solar panels in the clubhouse parking lots and the large-scale flood channel (under construction for several months and now in its final stages) that lies between the road link known as Manorgate-Brandywine-Pineknoll.

Travis regularly meets with Clint Atherton, our GM, to review and discuss, among other things, what may have fallen into sudden disrepair and how quickly and efficiently it can be repaired and at what cost.

# What's Cooking?

This column is intended to highlight interesting dishes from a variety of cuisines from all over the world. Today I am making *Pomodori Arrosto alla Caprese*, roasted tomatoes Capri-style as a first course appetizer / antipasto.

Pomodori Arrosto alla Caprese Preheat your oven to 400 degrees.

Total baking time about 30 minutes.

- 4–6 vine-ripe medium tomatoes
- fresh basil
- shredded mozzarella
- extra virgin olive oil
- balsamic vinegar
- salt, pepper and aromatic dried herbs of your choice (*I like to add oregano, garlic-powder and parsley.*)

Wash the tomatoes, pat dry and slice about 1/3-inch thick (usually four slices per tomato). Place the slices on an oven tray with parchment paper. Drizzle slices with extra virgin olive oil (EVOO), season with salt, pepper and your herbs (oregano, etc.), and then a drizzle of balsamic vinegar (don't alter the sequence). Place the tray in the oven for 25 minutes.

Wash basil in cold water, pat dry and julienne. Have your shredded mozzarella ready, together with the julienned basil, EVOO, balsamic vinegar, salt and pepper.

When ready, remove the tomatoes from the oven. KEEP THE OVEN ON! Pinch an abundant amount of mozzarella onto every tomato slice. Repeat with the julienned basil. Add few drops of EVOO, balsamic vinegar, lightly salt and pepper and put back in the oven for 5 minutes or until the mozzarella is melted.

Take the tray out and let the tomatoes cool off for 5-10 minutes.

Serve on a small dish with toasted artisanal bread and a glass of pinot grigio.

"Here."


"Alright, that'll be six dollars and thirty-eight cents."

### This Motherless Land

#### Ву Nikki May

May, who was born in Bristol, raised in Lagos and is Anglo-Nigerian, is loosely retelling Jane Austen's *Mansfield Park*, Austen's most political and critically controversial novel.

May's novel is structured around four crucial moments in the lives of two cousins, Funke, Nigerian-born and biracial, and Liv, English-born and white. The novel explores custom and class and how family ties both bind and divide.

In the first section, ten-year old Funke is living comfortably in Lagos with her parents and brother, when her problems are superstitious and disapproving relatives, her annoying younger brother, and her status as a girl in a country where boys are favored.

On the way to school, where Funke's mother teaches, their car slides under a stalled oil tanker. Funke's mother and brother are killed. Only Funke survives.

"No one wore seat belts in 1978 Lagos. No one except Funke, who always followed the rules."

The family convinces Funke's father to send her to her mother's family in England where she is known as Katherine /Kate (her middle name). Like Austen's Fanny Price, Kate is at the mercy of supposedly better-off relatives. Kate learns quickly, "England wasn't a fairy-tale land of plenty and these people weren't rich. The house was run-down and worn out holes in the rugs, squeaky floors, ramshackle furniture."

But Kate has Liv, her cousin, who welcomes her. The opposite of Liv's bother, who calls Kate *Zebra*, and Liv's mother Margot, who resents Kate because she reminds her of her sister of whom she was always jealous.

Kate and Liv grow up in the first section of the book as the closest of friends.

It is in England that Kate believes she'll *find her mother*, or the things her mother talked about, but she finds nothing that reminds her of her mother.

The story jumps to 1986 London. Kate has secured a university scholarship, and Liv, who wants to be a model, is blackmailed by a fraudulent modeling scout after a racy photo shoot. Other crises occur and Kate becomes the scapegoat. Since she is no longer a minor, Margot sends Kate back to Nigeria.
